3. Adoption of new members to Bolton CVS 1 April 2021 – 31 March 2022

Phil with Adrian gave a summary of the membership changes during the year.

- 32 groups joined us; 20 Full Members (based and operating in Bolton), 12 Associate (operating in Bolton but not registered office in Bolton)
- Of the 20 new Full members, 8 of them (40%) are social enterprises (CICs)
- Of the 8 CICs, 2 were formed in 2020 and the remaining6all formed during 2021 i.e. we have seen a trend in new social enterprises coming out of the pandemic.
- The CICs cover services for people with learning disabilities, the development of young leaders, the recycling of IT equipment, the promotion of the environment, and sports development.
- We accepted our first non- constituted group into Associate membership; Lend a Hand Horwich. This group emerged out of the initial crisis of the first lockdown and did a sterling work for the Horwich community.
- During the year we identified that 3 of our Membership groups had disbanded.

Dawn thanked the team for sharing some of what has happened during the last year and how the team are here to support the growth of groups in the collective sector.

5. Summary of Financial activity in the year

Shelley Ashton, Head of Finance, gave a summary of some of the key numbers within our Annual Report.

Our total income increased during the year **by £968,110** to **£3,410,467**. Of this **69%** came via our Funding Programmes. **19%** came from partnerships with Bolton at Home; Bolton Hospital Foundation Trust; Bolton and South Lancs. Rail Partnership and Greater Manchester Combined Authority – these were to fund posts within Bolton CVS. **7%** was for core funding from Bolton Council including Public Health. **5%** was Unrestricted income self-generated by The Bolton Hub and a number of grants that supported our core costs during the year.

During the year we distributed £1,252,205 of grants, a decrease of £254,502 on the previous year.

The Restricted Fund Balance of £3,388,875 include £660,770 which relates to the book value of The Bolton Hub. The Annual Report has a summary of all Restricted Funds.

Shelley asked that the Annual Report and Accounts be adopted, copies of which had been distributed prior to this meeting.
